JUDGES CV
Bitches – Pam Price (Leamap)_(Great Danes)

Hi I am Pam Price (Leamap) Great Danes, Leamap being an anagram of Pamela, as a child I usually had a terrier about my heels as my grandmother bred West Highland white and Fox Terriers, as a teenager I visited a friend who had a beautiful Brindle Great Dane, I was immediately smitten and vowed one day I would own a Great Dane. A few years after I married we bought a black and white Dalmatian bitch (Dino) she had a litter when she was three years old and we kept a Liver spotted bitch puppy, both bitches lived to be 16 years old. We then purchased our first Great Dane a 7-month-old fawn bitch who had outgrown her home, she was Dicarl/Aysdaine breeding we met the breeder who was most helpful, and she introduced me to my first show, where I met my first Blue Dane, and the rest is history.

My first Blue came from Peter and Rae Russell of Endroma Great Danes, we bought a blue bitch, and later on, Peter said, come to ring craft then you can start showing. I soon got the bug. We later bought a black bitch from Peter, and a year later we bought our first Blue Male Endroma Leopold, who over the next two years, won many awards, culminating in becoming a Champion, he gained 7 CC's and 10 RCC's. and is still today the blue male record holder for CC's in this country.

At the time I was showing I was influenced by Endroma, Dicarl, Devarro these kennels were in my local area, and I later met Karina Le Mare (Helmlake) and her wonderful Harlequins, in the early 90s, there were many well-known breeders, and they were very influential in the ring. The Danes they showed had tonnes of bone and substance, yet still possessed majesty and elegance.

My foundation Dog was CH Endroma Leopold (Blue) he had a superb temperament which is so important in any breed especially giant breeds, he lived in the house, and loved his home comforts, he lived just short of his 12th birthday. He was lightly used at stud and produced some nice puppies.

I have been very lucky to breed two Black Champions and two Blue Champions, my blue bitch Ch. Leamap Iron Maiden (Paris) was the first Blue bitch in 33 years to become a champion, one of the proudest days of my show career.

I have now stopped breeding, but my stud dogs have left their mark on many lines, and I truly hope their legacy carries on.

I think the best example of the breed that I have bred is Ch Leamap Whisky Galore (Luther) a big strong well balanced Black of substance and presents, he gained his title at 17 months. My Blue bitch Ch Leamap Iron Maiden (Paris) a superb feminine well balanced bitch, not the biggest, but had lovely flowing lines, and just floated round the ring. She's nearly ten years old and still retains her super shape.

I have health tested my Danes over the years and I would advise anyone thinking of breeding to cover as many tests that are available. It can only benefit the breed.

The Great Dane is a noble breed, and a good temperament is essential. The males need to be well muscled, with bone and substance that will enable him to stride out with power, but also retain elegance and style. A well balanced head, arched neck, well filled front and good lay of shoulder, depth of rib, level topline with slight rise over loin, good turn of stifle and tight feet, and move with reach and drive.

JUDGES CV

Bitches – Mr Nigel Marriner (*MARRIDANE*) (Great Danes)

I started in 1978 with my fawn girl 'Helmlake Solitaire' followed by my brindle girl 'Selina of Tollydane', then in 1980 my harlequin girl 'Lady of the Lake of Helmlake'.

'Helmlake Solitaire' had a litter in 1980 by 'Daneglas Eurus of Walkmyl' and from her litter came 'Witchcraft of Helmlake' and 'Magic Spell of Helmlake' both top winning puppies at the time, 'Magic Spell' had a litter of puppies whilst owned by Bob Otto and Matti Pakarinen from which 'Ch. Batwoth Bombadier', 'Batworth Bombastine' and 'Batworth Bombshell' were born.

These were my 'Novice' years with Great Danes, and after 9 years, in 1987, just after my fawn girl sadly passed away, a harlequin boy was born, 'Helmlake Quo Vadis of Marridane' (Antaeus), I then started to learn more about showing, how to present myself and my Dane, plus how to enter the ring to be noticed, my friend played a big part in this, thank you Mandy T.

'Antaeus' went on to be my first Champion, a fabulous boy and my companion for many years, he also is the 2nd highest 'CC' winning male harlequin of all time, GB records. He won JW, 11 CC's, 4 Res. CC's, Res Working Group, Pedigree Chum Champ Stakes Final 1991 and many top level acclaims including Top Dog, South Western Great Dane Super Leagues 1991.

In 1989 a gorgeous harlequin girl was born 'Batworth Obsession for Marridane' (Sessy) who again became a Champion, tragically, she died from bloat at 3 years old, after winning her 23rd CC at Builth Wells. Sessy gained the Harlequin CC record in 1991, which had been held in 1947 by a bitch & then equalled by another bitch in 1953 at 16 CC's. She was also 'Top Bitch' and Overall Winner South Western Great Dane Super Leagues 1991 and joint runner-up at Contest of Champions 1992.

Killhelm Coco of Marridane (Suki), my other harlequin girl was born in 1993 and Quo Vadis's daughter, she achieved 1 RCC in 1995 plus colour awards, such a gentle girl.

In 1998 our fawn girl was born, 'Clausentum Phenomenon of Marridan' (Xena), who had many successes as a puppy and junior.

That's the part that only the 'Old Timers' will remember and now to come a little further up to date.

2006, 'Selmalda Has To Be of Marridane' was born, bred by Leslie & Adam Chappell, he gained his JW and then his title in 2008, winning 4 CC's, 5 RCC's, SWGDC Premier Leagues Overall Winner 2007 & Super Leagues Top Dog 2008.

I am very honoured to have been considered to judge Championship Shows, my first appointment was Southern Counties 1999, followed by Scottish Great Dane Club 2003, Great Dane Breeders & Owners 2004, South Western Great Dane Club 2008, East of England Great Dane Club 2016 and now The Great Dane Club of Wales 2022.

I have been a committee member of the Great Dane Breeders & Owners Association. Currently I am the Treasurer of The South Western Great Dane Club & The Great Dane Breed Council

Definitions Of Classes

In the following definitions, a Challenge Certificate includes any show award that counts towards the title of Champion under the Rules of any governing body recognised by The Kennel Club.

Wins at championship Shows in breed classes where Challenge Certificates are not on offer shall be counted as wins at Open Shows.

In the case of a dog owned in partnership and entered in Members' classes or competing for Members' Specials each partner must at the time of entry be a member of the Society.

In estimating the number of awards won, all wins up to and including the seventh day before the date of closing of entries shall be counted when entering for any class i.e. **19th September 2022**

Wins in Variety classes do not count for entry in Breed classes but when entering in Variety classes, wins in both Breed and Variety classes must be counted. First prizes awarded in any classes defined as Special do not count towards eligibility.

If an exhibitor reports before the judging of a class or classes that a dog has been entered which is ineligible, the exhibitor may choose one of the following options:-

- (1) Withdrawal
The dog may be withdrawn from competition subject to the conditions of Regulation F.(1).19
- (2) Transfer
 - a) If a dog is ineligible
for a class or classes as regards its colour, sex, weight or height the Show Secretary shall transfer it to the equivalent class or classes for the correct colour, sex, weight or height and, in the event of there being no equivalent class, Minor Puppy and Puppy excepted to the Open class for the correct colour, sex, weight or height.
 - b) For an exhibit entered incorrectly in a Minor Puppy Class, Puppy Class or Junior Class, which is over age but under twelve calendar months of age, eighteen calendar months of age or 24 calendar months of age respectively, the Show Secretary shall transfer the exhibit to the Puppy Class, Junior Class or Yearling Class respectively for the correct colour, sex, weight or height and in the event of there being no Puppy, Junior or Yearling Class to the Open Class for the correct colour, sex, weight or height.
 - c) For any reason other than the above, the Show Secretary shall transfer it to the Open Class for the correct colour, sex, weight or height.
 - d) If an exhibit arrives late and misses a class, even if it is the only class in which the dog is entered, the dog may not be transferred to any other class.

MINOR PUPPY: For dogs of six and not exceeding nine calendar months of age on the first day of the Show.

PUPPY: For dogs of six and not exceeding twelve calendar months of age on the first day of the Show.

JUNIOR: For dogs of six and not exceeding eighteen calendar months of age on the first day of the Show.

YEARLING: For dogs of twelve and not exceeding twenty four months of age on the first day of the Show.

NOVICE: For dogs which have not won a Challenge Certificate/CACIB/CAC/Green Star or three or more First Prizes at Open and Championship Shows (Minor Puppy, Special Minor Puppy, Puppy and Special Puppy classes excepted, whether restricted or not).

GRADUATE: For dogs which have not won a Challenge Certificate/CACIB/CAC/Green Star or four or more First Prizes at Championship Shows in Graduate, Post Graduate, Minor Limit, Mid Limit, Limit and Open classes, whether restricted or not where Challenge Certificates were offered for the breed.

POST GRADUATE: For dogs which have not won a Challenge Certificate/CACIB/CAC/Green Star or five or more First Prizes at Championship Shows in Post Graduate, Minor Limit, Mid Limit, Limit and Open classes, whether restricted or not where Challenge Certificates were offered for the breed.

LIMIT: For dogs which have not become show Champions under The Kennel Club Regulations or under the rules of any governing body recognised by The Kennel Club, or won 3 or more CC/CACIB/CAC/Green Stars or won 7 or more First Prizes in all at Championship Shows in Limit or Open Classes confined to the Breed, whether restricted or not at Shows where Challenge Certificates were offered for the breed.

OPEN: For all dogs of the Breed for which the class is provided and eligible for entry at the Show.

SPECIAL OPEN: As for Open but restricted to colour stated.

SPECIAL VETERAN: For dogs of not less than six years of age on the day of the Show.

NOT FOR COMPETITION (NFC): Societies may at their own discretion accept Not for Competition entries. Societies may accept such entries from breeds of dog not included within the title of the Society and at Shows held over more than one day, such entries may be accepted on the day from any Breed.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. OPENING OF SHOW: The Show will open at 9.30 a.m.
2. ARRIVAL OF DOGS: Dogs will be received at any time, but it is the exhibitors responsibility to ensure that exhibits are available for judging when required.
3. JUDGING WILL COMMENCE: NOT BEFORE 12 a.m. (Upon Completion of the Breed judging of South Wales Kennel Association)
4. CLOSE OF SHOW: The Show will close half an hour after all judging has been completed at which time dogs must be removed. Dogs may be removed after their judging is complete.
5. ENTRY FEES: **Members** First entry - **£11.00 per dog.**
Non-Members First entry - **£16.00 per dog.**
Subsequent entries with same dog - **£2.00 per class**
Not for Competition: £5.00 per dog (full details must be given on the entry form)
Catalogues: Pre-paid with entry **£3.00** (*Catalogues on the day £3.50*)
Membership: Single £4.50, Joint £6.00.
Adverts in Show Catalogue: £10 per page.

6. PRIZE MONEY: There is no prize money on offer at this Show.
7. The Committee reserves to itself the right to refuse entries.
8. Puppies under six calendar months of age on the first day of the Show are not eligible for exhibition.
9. The mating of bitches within the precincts of the Show is forbidden.

10. Best Puppy in Show

Where a Best Puppy in Show competition is scheduled the Best Puppy in Show is a puppy which has competed and is unbeaten by any other puppy exhibited at the same show. A puppy is a dog of six and not exceeding twelve calendar months of age on the first day of the Show. Where the Best in Show is a puppy it may, at the discretion of the judge, be awarded Best Puppy in Show. Where the Reserve Best in Show is a puppy which has only been beaten by an adult dog it may, at the discretion of the judge, be Best Puppy in Show. Consequently, selection of Best Puppy in Show must follow the selection of Best in Show.

11. Best in Show

Best in Show must be selected from the exhibits declared Best of Sex. If a Reserve Best in Show is to be selected, the eligible dogs are those declared Best Opposite Sex and Reserve Best of Sex to the exhibit declared Best in Show.

12. Exhibits will not be admitted to Best in Show competition after a period of ten minutes has elapsed since the announcement that exhibits are required for judging, unless they have been unavoidably delayed by previous judging not being completed on time, and then only with the special permission of the Show Management.
13. Exhibitors must not pick up dogs by their tails and leads when lifting them nor handle a dog in a manner which causes its feet not touch the ground when on the move. This is not acceptable. Exhibitors should note that such practice would constitute harsh handling and reports of such practice will be referred to the Committee under Kennel Club Show Regulation F11.
14. All exhibitors must be familiar with Kennel Club Regulation F (Annex B) Regulations for the Preparation of Dogs for Exhibition.
15. All dogs resident outside the UK must be issued with a Kennel Club authority to compete number before entry to the show/event can be made. All overseas entries without an authority to compete number will be returned to the exhibitor/competitor.
16. DOGS IN VEHICLES ON HOT DAYS: Anyone whose dog is entered at a Kennel Club licensed event should take all reasonable steps to ensure the needs of their dog(s) are met, and should not put a dog's health and welfare at risk by any action, default, omission or otherwise. Breach of Kennel Club Regulations in this respect may be referred to the Board for disciplinary action under the Kennel Club Rules and Regulations.

Your dog is vulnerable and at risk during hot weather and the Kennel Club offers the following guidance to help guide you through the do's and don'ts travelling to and whilst at KC licensed events.

- ☉ When travelling to a show please take a moment to consider whether the route to the show is on a busy holiday route, and leave earlier to avoid increased time in traffic jams.
- ☉ If your vehicle is not air-conditioned seriously consider whether travelling to the show is a good idea at all.
- ☉ The vehicle should be as fully ventilated as possible, and plenty of stops should be taken, with lots of water available to drink.
- ☉ Ensure your dog is not sitting in full sunlight. There should be plenty of free flowing air around the dog.
- ☉ When at the show, never leave your dog in the vehicle.

© Keep the dog in the shade – take your own shade for example a large umbrella and always have plenty of water available to drink so your dog stays well hydrated.

© Avoid your dog taking part in unnecessary exertion, or from standing in exposed sunlight for extended lengths of time.

Remember, if you feel hot your dog is very likely to feel much hotter and dehydrated, and this could lead to dire results. Please look after your dog's welfare.

WARNING: IF YOUR DOG IS FOUND TO BE AT RISK FORCIBLE ENTRY TO YOUR VEHICLE MAY BE NECESSARY WITHOUT LIABILITY FOR ANY DAMAGE CAUSED.

17. Anyone whose dog is entered at a Kennel Club licensed event should take all reasonable steps to ensure the needs of their dog(s) are met, and should not put a dog's health and welfare at risk by any action, default, omission or otherwise. Breach of Kennel Club Regulations in this respect may be referred to the Board for disciplinary action under the Kennel Club Rules and Regulations. The use of pinch collars, electronic shock collars, or prong collars, is not permitted at any show licensed by the Kennel Club. This shall apply at the venue or within the precincts of the show. No modifications will be made to this schedule except by permission of the Board of the Kennel Club, which will be followed by advertisement in the Canine Press wherever possible.
18. Not for Competition entries will be accepted. Details of each dog so entered must be recorded on the entry form and must be Kennel Club registered
19. No modifications will be made to the schedule except by permission of the Board of the Kennel Club, which will be followed by advertisement in the Canine Press wherever possible.
20. **Best Veteran in Show**
The dog declared Best Veteran in Show must be selected from Best Veteran in Sex. Reserve Best Veteran in Show must be selected from the remaining Best Veteran of Sex(s) and the dog/bitch declared by the breed judge to be Reserve Best Veteran of Sex to the dog declared Best Veteran in Show.

THE GREAT DANE BREED COUNCIL

It has been brought to the Council's attention that the temperament in Great Danes is deteriorating. Therefore this notification will be in Schedules and Catalogues. It is intended as a guide to both Judges and Exhibitors.

KC Rule 15 - EXCLUSION OF DOGS:

If in the opinion of the Show Secretary, Show Manager or Judge any dog is considered not in a fit state for exhibition owing to disease, savage disposition, or any other cause, the dog may be excluded or removed from the Show on the instruction of the Show management. Once excluded or removed from the Show the dog must not be brought into the Show at any time under any circumstances and the case must be reported in full to the Kennel Club within 7 days. Judges may send the dog out if the dog appears to have an aggressive disposition.

REGULATIONS FOR THE PREPARATION OF DOGS FOR EXHIBITION F (Annex B)

1. These Regulations must be observed when a dog is prepared for exhibition and/or exhibited at any Kennel Club Licensed event. Objections may be referred to the General Committee for disciplinary action under these Show Regulations and/or for disciplinary action under Kennel Club Rule A42.
 - a) A dog found to have been exhibited in breach of these Regulations will automatically be disqualified from exhibition at the Show and from any award gained thereat.
 - b) Unless the exhibitor provides a satisfactory explanation for the dog being exhibited in breach of these Regulations then he/she may be subject to further penalties of either a fine or as listed under Rule A42.
2. (a) No substance which alters the natural colour, texture, or body of the coat may be present in the dog's coat for any purpose at any time during the Show. No substance which alters the natural colour of any external part of the dog may be present on the dog for any purpose at any time during the show.
 - (b) Any other substance (other than water) which may be used in the preparation of a dog for exhibition must not be allowed to remain in the coat or on any other part of the dog at the time of exhibition.
3. No act or operation which alters the natural conformation of a dog or any part thereof may be performed except:-
 - (a) Operations certified to the satisfaction of the General Committee.
 - (b) The removal of dewclaws of any breed.
 - (c) Operations to prevent breeding, provided that such operations are notified to the Kennel Club before neutered dogs are shown.Nor must anything be done calculated in the opinion of the General Committee to deceive.
4. The General Committee without previous notice may order an examination of any dog or dogs at any show. Any examination thus ordered will be made by a person having executive authority who shall have a written directive from the Kennel Club in their possession. Samples may be taken for further examination and analysis.
5. An individual has the right to lodge an objection to a dog only if he/she is the owner or handler of a dog competing in the same breed or class. An objection may, however, be lodged by an official of the show or by anyone so deputed by the Kennel Club. It will be the responsibility of the individual who lodges the objection or the official (as appropriate) to substantiate the grounds for the objection. The Kennel Club will substantiate the grounds for an objection made on its behalf.

Use of Electrical Equipment at Shows

The Kennel Club is becoming increasingly concerned at the amount of electrical equipment being used by exhibitors at shows, including hair dryers and hair straighteners and other grooming devices.

Electrical equipment should not be brought to shows unless absolutely necessary. In rare instances where it might be required, it should be PAT tested and permission sought from the secretary of the show before it is used.

The Kennel Club has also been informed of recent instances of exhibitors commandeering certain areas of a venue in order to have access to power points so as to use electrical grooming equipment. This is totally unacceptable and particularly unfair on the breeds whose allocated areas have been cramped because of this selfish behaviour.

Security at Shows

In light of recent events The Kennel Club would like to issue a reminder to all Societies of the importance of security at dog shows.

The Kennel Club understands that due to the nature of dog shows and the quantity of paraphernalia exhibitors bring it would be extremely difficult for show organisers to take on the issue of security alone, therefore we would reiterate the advice being given by the Police and security services, that everyone in the UK should remain vigilant and this applies to those organising and taking part in dog shows.

The importance of exhibitors feeling that they and their dogs are safe when attending a show cannot be underestimated. We would therefore remind you of the importance of the need for show organisers and exhibitors to remain mindful of potential dangers and that all visitors generally need to be vigilant and alert.

Further more the society should provide robust notification informing exhibitors of where to report to should they see anything suspicious or of concern, and of the evacuation procedures in place.

Judging at Partnership Shows

Due to the current increase in partnership shows being held, The Kennel Club would like to clarify its position with regard to judging at such events.

Partnership shows are those which are held where a host society and another club share a venue and facilities in order to allow exhibitors the opportunity to exhibit at two events during the duration of the host society's show. In most cases, the host society's event will be a general championship show held over a number of days. At partnership shows judges must not officiate at one show and enter or handle a dog for exhibition at the other show including exhibiting a different breed on another day to that which they are to judge. Partnership shows are defined as shows where the host club and other clubs share a venue and other facilities to allow exhibitors the opportunity to exhibit at each show.
